## 2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

- ✓ Digital literacy through online courses, e-notes, e-books, etc.
- ✓ Communication networking through voicemail system with parents, Teachers and Students
- ✓ Student's online feedback system.
- ✓ Digitalized admission system.
- ✓ Continuous Assessment Tests are conducted every day for 30 minutes before the commencement of regular classes to all UG and PG students.
- ✓ Through NPTEL Local Chapter, students enroll to various courses offered by Indian Institute of Technology, Madras. As a part of digital learning initiative, students are exposed to different avenues of knowledge. As a result, 96 students from various disciplines appeared for online exam during this year in which 94 students successfully completed different courses and got respective certificates.
- ✓ Coaching classes are arranged for PG students to face NET/SLET examinations.
- ✓ Multiple Choice Questions for skill based papers such as Effective Employability skills, competitive examination skills are practiced.
- ✓ Induction of Bridge course for first year students
- ✓ Remedial and Enrichment courses for poor and medium learners are arranged.
- ✓ Students are encouraged to participate in seminars and conferences and teachers do confidence building among the students by conducting mock presentation.

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## 2.8. Examination/ Evaluation Reforms initiated by the Institution (for example: Open Book Examination, Bar Coding, Double Valuation, Photocopy, Online Multiple Choice Questions)

1. Assessment of performance is an integral part of teaching and learning processes. As a part of effective educational strategy, the institution adopts **Continuous Internal Evaluation** system to assess all aspects of a students' development on a continuous basis throughout the year.
2. Result analysis is done by the course teacher after every continuous assessment test by calculating the pass percentage in each subject. The performance of the students is monitored by the principal and necessary instructions are given to the concerned faculty members.

3. **Tutorial card System** is followed in the Departments. The Departments maintains report card of the students. The parents are advised to meet the faculty members twice a year to discuss the progress of the students in the university level examinations.
  4. **Remedial Classes** are conducted for the slow learners, absentees and the students who took part in co-curricular activities. This practice helps the absentees to update and enrich their subject knowledge. These efforts help to improve the performance of students by framing significant reforms in **Continuous Internal Evaluation** at the institutional level.
  5. IQAC of our college has recommended conducting daily test for half an hour before first hour i.e., 10.00 AM to 10.30 AM., on all working days. Schedule of the invigilator and the subject for each day order is prepared and followed. Staff members of concerned subject are responsible for evaluation and maintenance of mark records. This continuous internal daily test increases the pass percentage as well as the continuous reading habits of the students. Besides, two cumulative internal assessment tests are being conducted in each semester and evaluated by the concern staff members. It helps to assess the internal marks. Average of these two internal test, assignment and seminar marks are considered for calculating total internal marks. In science departments model practical examinations are carried out and are used to award internal marks in practical work.
  6. After the publication of the results by the University, department-wise data are scrutinized and the result analysis is critically reviewed by the principal.
  7. As a part of reform method to monitor the performance of the students, parents are asked to meet the concerned Mentor to discuss if there are any personal issues. As remedial measures students are advised to take test after completing every unit. They are also given ample space to discuss the previous year questions in the class room. Question Banks prepared by the respective departments help the students to prepare for the final examinations. All these reform methods have significantly enhanced the pass percentage of the students. Students are also encouraged to use online-portals and video lectures to improve their learning.
  8. Above all the students are encouraged to explore new ideas through critical thinking, group activities, discussions, debates, seminars to enhance their performance level.

  1. The IQAC regularly collects feedback from the students, parents and alumni through questionnaires to evaluate and improvise teaching and learning process.
  2. Based on the university results IQAC advises all the departments to take necessary steps for the improvement of slow learners..
  3. IQAC motivates all staff members to use ICT method of teaching for at least one course.

4. IQAC encourages all the staff members to attend Faculty Improvement Programme such as Refresher and Orientation courses conducted by the Academic Staff College all over the country to update their knowledge.
5. IQAC also motivates the faculty members to attend seminars, conferences, workshops and symposiums to enhance their knowledge and to introduce them the frontier developments in their respective fields.

- NPTEL Local Chapter supports the students to get scholarship for enrolling in online courses. So far, 96 students have been provided scholarship through NPTEL.
- Department of Zoology, Youth Red Cross and Red Ribbon Club jointly organized a Blood Donors Registration Camp. In case of any emergency for blood, students belonging to the particular group are identified, informed and directed them to be made available in the hospitals.
- Digitalized Question banks are made available to the students in the library.
- Reputed national dailies “The New Indian Express” are distributed to the students at a concessional rate to encourage the students to read daily news.
- Both students and their parents are covered under accidental insurance policy.
- Additional books for competitive examinations have been purchased.

#### 5.2. Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

## 5.6 Details of student counseling and career guidance

- ✓ Each and every student is allotted a particular faculty member as mentor. The mentor monitors their respective ward's performance and behavior.

Institution level counseling cell has a group of faculty which is headed by a Vice-Principal. Counseling cell will review the issue and give appropriate orientation. If the problem persists, it will be referred to the parents and disciplinary committee.
- ✓ The Career Guidance Cell of Arumugam Pillai Seethai Ammal College in tie-up with District Employment Office, Sivagangai organized Coaching classes for TNPSC Group – IV competitive examinations. Mr. N. Ramanan, Founder, Mentor Academy, Madurai took classes for the students who applied for TNPSC GROUP-IV Competitive examinations. Around 275 students attended and benefited.

### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- ❖ The curriculum is prepared by the board of studies, Alagappa University with the aid of staff members from the university and affiliated colleges. Being affiliated to Alagappa University, Karaikudi, our institution follows the curriculum aspects of the university.
- ❖ Out of 73 faculty members from our institution 3 members were appointed as Chairman of the Board of Studies and 15 were appointed as members of the Boards. Our faculty members impart necessary alterations to make the syllabus up-to-date.

## ANNEXURE-IV

### PRACTICE – I

**(i) Title : Digital Literacy (DL)**

**(ii). Objective : To enhance the literacy level of students through digital technology**

**(iii). Context :**

Enhanced digital technology and learning may help to acquire enhanced global level competencies. So, “digital literacy” is achieving these goals using technology. Digital literacy implies the same reading-writing skills, but without paper, pencils, conventional books in physical forms, or lectures. It is user friendly and a green practice. Digital literacy also refers to content creation, writing in digital formats, *etc.* The digital-writing tools are designed to help students for preparing their seminars, and assignments. Digital literacy technology offers many benefits like storage of voluminous books and reference materials in minimum space, get books and reference materials at minimum cost, easy to carry the reading materials in digital formats, store in cloud for 24 X 7 accesses, *etc.*

**(iv) Execution of the Practice:**

Teaching faculties have uploaded their e-notes and other reading materials in the website of the institution. Students are given free access to down load the content. Professors also give their lecture materials in ppts form to the students for further references. The E-notes are being periodically revised and the E-content of the journal are made available to the students on request. Students are motivated to go for online courses in NPTEL. Students are also encouraged to submit their assignment and seminar ppts in the digital format. It helps the faculties to identify the improvement in learner’s level of understanding about the subject and preparation for the final exams and project work.

**(v) Evidence of Success**

Students have shown interest in online courses. During the academic year 2017-2018 96 students have registered NPTEL courses and 94 have passed. Some students have prepared power point and taken seminar using digital technology.

**vi) Outcome:**

All faculty members have prepared e-notes for at least one subject and uploaded in the college website. The students are becoming familiar in online aided learning method that helps to refer the international learning resources. We have received hundreds of request from the students to grant permission to access e-notes from the college website.

**Practice II:**

**i) Title: Parent-Teacher-Student Communication Network**

**ii) Objective :** To establish a communication network (digital and audio visual) and to provide information to parents, students and faculty members regarding academic matters.

**iii) Context:**

Parent, Teacher and Student are the main pillars of an educational institution. Networking among these three stakeholders is of paramount importance. Conventional communication through postal service does not deliver the message instantly and vulnerable for missing, damaging, misplacing etc. Hence, to cope up with the modern trend, easy way of communication, instant delivery and response, requires for digital and audiovisual networking among Parents, Teachers and Students. Many parents are not aware of the college reopening day, closing day, commencement of examinations, academic status of their wards, campus interviews, and placement, coaching classes for competitive examinations, University examination schedule, last date for fees payment, etc. Likewise students are also need networking to share academic messages, missing lectures and various events of the institution. Faculty members find difficulty in contacting the out gone students to collect information regarding career advancement, placement and communicating to Alumni Meetings, Graduation day etc. Hence, there is a strong need for **Parent-Teacher-Student Communication Network**.

**iv) Execution of the Practice:**

Considering the strong need for communication networking, IQAC of our institution has recommended digital and media based communication networking. Hence, all departments have formed a whatsapp group for each batch of students in which academic news are regularly

posted. All HoDs have collected e-mail ID and phone numbers of all students. Institution has also established tie-up with Reliance Communications for free voicemail to all parents, students and faculties. In addition, institution has also planned BULK SMS system to inform the parents about student's status of attendance to the classes, college reopening day, closing day, commencement of examinations, etc.

#### V) Evidence of Success:


- Our college collaborates with Reliance Communications to send academic information to students, parents and faculties members through the voice mail.

#### (VI). Problems Encountered and Resources Required


Since it is a voluntary help by the institution to the parents and students and ensured the instant communication, the stakeholders feel happy and we have not come across any problems.
